## 2025 GMWC August 3 Day Carving Seminar- Scale Great Blue Heron

At the Annual Meeting we began the discussion of the subject for our August 2025 3 Day Carving Class. Several ideas were discussed ranging from a sea turtle to a Santa. Barb thought as we have done several wildfowl in the past sessions maybe something else except maybe a great Blue Heron. At our November CarveIn we continued the discussion, and looked at a pattern for a small Great Blue Heron from Hillman's Carving Water Birds Book. Barb had expressed interest, and 3 others at the CarveIn said they wanted to take the class, so we decided to go ahead. Like the Swan and the Mallard the Heron can be carved in a variety of styles from a simple folk art style to a fully feathered and painted Heron, depending on what each carver wants to do. Plus due to its size, the class is suitable for both novice and more experienced carvers. Like the Mallard, Matt will be the instructor, and Bob will be covering texturing and painting. We expect to offer the class for the same price as before and will have more about the class to pass along in the next issue.



## November CarveIn Report:

Our November CarveIn was hosted by President Matthew Strong at his Studio in Stowe Vermont on November 9<sup>th</sup>. Not being Deer Season yet, your Editor was able to attend along with six other members. We couldn't have asked for a nicer day, bright sunshine with temps in the mid 40's. Matt had the shop all

cleaned and the coffee ready with muffins and donut holes to carry us thru the morning. After a week of Presidential Election coverage, we pretty much kept the conversations on carving and not politics. 3 had brought their Mallards to work on painting, so they moved to one end of the table to focus on painting, while the other 4 worked on carvings, ranging from small and larger spoon carvings, to comfort birds and of course Christmas ornaments. Around noon Matt brought down a large crockpot of chilli and bread for he had made for lunch, and we pretty much cleaned up the crockpot. During lunch we discussed some of the possibilities for the August Class and as three attending said they wanted to sign up to carve a small Blue Heron, decided that would be a good choice, as we already had 4 interested.. We worked till around 2:30 and called it a day.

Take Exit 4 off I-89. At the end of the ramp, turn downhill toward the convenience store and McDonald's. Travel straight about 2.6 miles until you see Cumberland Farms on the left. Turn left at Cumberland Farms bringing you onto Main Street. Follow Main Street for about 1.1 miles and Magee will be on the left, just out of the village. Magee is a long brown building diagonally across from Tire Warehouse. Look for a huge granite sign-post in front of the building, as well as GMWC Carve-In signs. Park in the lot on the left. **Directions from the north:**

Take I-91 South to the Westminster Exit #5, then Route 5 South to Westminster Center, clock your mileage at this point the shop is about 3 miles on the right. The house has cedar siding and a green metal roof. Watch for the sign on the shop.

**Directions from the south:**

Take I-91 North to the Putney Exit #4, then Route 5 north (about 6 miles), passing Harlow's Sugar House on the right, just past the Sugar House clock the mileage from the bridge going past I-91, the shop is 2 miles on the left.



### Carving Pattern -

With the Holidays now past, hopefully unlike me, you were all able to finish your Christmas carvings on schedule. Finding a pattern to put into each issue is always a challenge, Dave has helped out with the patterns and photos from his April CarveIn, and I also rely on past issues of News And Notes from when Collise was Editor. If you have a pattern you would like to share, please make a New Year's Resolution to pass it along so we can share it with others in the Newsletter. This pattern came from a book of stylized patterns, and reminds me of the next step after carving a comfort bird. When rounded and balanced correctly, it is supposed to perch on the edge of a table. A hardwood like walnut, butternut or mahogany would be a nice choice of wood. Enlarge to 6 to 8", and reduce if you are using 1" stock.
